Subject: Civics Grade/Class: 10 (Open)

Date: Tuesday, November, 17, 2015 **Time:** 9:00-10:15am

Duration: 7 minutes

Lesson Topic: Left Wing and Right Wing: Political Parties and their Positions

CURRICULUM EXPECTATIONS:

A1.6 Evaluate and synthesize their findings to formulate conclusions and/or make informed judgements or predictions about the issues, events, and/or developments they are investigating.

A1.7 Communicate their ideas, arguments, and conclusions using various formats and styles.

- B1.4 Communicate their own position on some issues of civic importance at the local, national, and/or global level, explaining how their position is influenced by their beliefs/values.

SPECIFIC EXPECTATIONS:

By the end of the lesson students should/will be able to:

- 1. Understand the difference between left wing and right wing parties
- 2. Note which parties are left wing and which parties are right wing and why
- **3.** Think critically about the parties and their positions and how it relates to their own beliefs and opinions
- **4.** Apply one of the positions of the left-right wing spectrum to their beliefs and form an argument

LEARNING/TEACHING RESOURCES:

Computer-YouTube video

Left Wing or Right Wing game and accessories – 3-5

Platforms of NDP, PC, and Liberals - 3 of each, total 9

Pens and paper

LESSON SEQUENCE

A) INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITY

Watch YouTube video of Left Wing vs Right Wing. Go over the main points from the video and have a mini question-answer discussion. Talk about bias and its effects. (5 min) https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=QuNEFHK-Q-E

B) DEVELOPMENTAL STRATEGIES:

Activity 1

Split the class into groups (no more than 6 per group). Have them play the "Left Wing or Right Wing" game (instructions on the game board). Make sure students note their findings (what party/wing they side with). (15 min)

Activity 2

Rearrange students into 3 large groups, based on where they ended in the game (left wing, left-centre, and right wing). If students do not agree with the outcomes of the game, they can choose a different group. Try to make groups as even as possible. Have groups read the platforms of the parties that associate with their side. Allow students to look up additional platform information with their cell phones. (15 min)

Activity 3

With the groups, have a debate. Teacher acts as speaker and controls who speaks. Students can either open up the floor about topics they feel passionate about (abortion, tuition rates, minimum wage) or teacher can lead the debate based on topics brought up in the game or in the platforms. (20 min)

Activity 4

Students return to their seats. Based on what they have learned, they write an unsent letter to whomever they choose (within reason) explaining why they now associate with a political wing (left, left-centre, right) and/or party. (10 min)

C) DIFFERENTIATED INSTRUCTIONAL STRATEGIES

Students prone to distraction will be paired with students who are not during the game. Students who require writing assistance can complete activities on a laptop and hand it in the next day. Additional assistance and instruction will be given as necessary. Students who are extremely shy and don't actively participate in the debate can still voice their opinions in other activities.

D) CULMINATING ACTIVITY:

Students will fold a piece of paper into 3 sections and complete a "What I Knew, What I Learned, and What I Want to Know" activity (students will label sections accordingly) (resembling the KWL strategy) before the end of class. (10 min)

E) ON-GOING ASSESSMENT/EVALUATION:

Student participation in the debate can be assessed informally. Written activities will be collected and assessed to ensure learned knowledge is correct.

REFLECTION & SELF-EVALUATION:

Use teacher candidate self-reflection prompt in day book.

FOLLOW-UP ACTIVITIES/IDEAS OR NEXT STEPS:

Review the game and debate and build on left and right wing and the political parties during next class, based on feedback from the activity (what they want to know). Go over instructions for future essay (end of unit).

How to Make a Political Spectrum Board Game

Materials You Will Need:


- Scissors
- Coloured construction paper (red, orange, blue, green and tan)
- Plain colour or white Bristol board
- Markers, pens or pencils
- Glue or tape
- Index cards
- Envelope
- Paper clips or game pieces
- List of possible questions
- Print outs of attached information sheets (Political Parties, Instructions and Play Cards)


<u>Instructions</u>

Step One:

Fold and cut Bristol board widthwise.

Keep only one of these pieces.





Step Two:

On your construction paper outline and cut squares.

Red = 4 squares in "I" shape

Green = 4 squares in "I" shape

Orange = 4 squares in "T" shape with one long block forming top of "T"

Blue = 8 squares in "T" shape with one long block forming top of "T"

Tan = 1 square

Step Three:

In the long boxes in the blue and orange squares write **LEFT** in orange and **RIGHT** in blue

In the tan box write CENTRE

Step Four:

Align and glue or tape the coloured squares along the middle of Bristol board in the following sequence:

Orange - Green - Red - Tan - Blue

This is now the coloured spectrum.





Step Five:

Above your coloured spectrum write **Left Wing or Right Wing**.


Step Six:

Fold index cards in half widthwise.

Step Seven:

On the outside of the folded index cards, write one of the questions found in the list of questions.

Do this for every index card and/or question from list.



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Step Eight:

On the inside of the index cards write the movement instructions.

However the Left Wing would answer, write "move one space to the left".

However the Right Wing would answer, write "move one space to the right".


If undecided, do not move.

Some movement instructions are more complex, such as the one shown here.

Step Nine:

On your Bristol board, below the coloured spectrum draw a square in the left hand corner with **QUESTION CARDS** written above.

This is where you will be placing the index cards once complete.



Step Ten:

In the right hand corner of the Bristol board cut and glue or tape the instructions for playing the game

Step Eleven:

Cut the Political Parties Handout into four sections based on the parties.

Blue: Conservative Party of Canada

Green: Green Party of Canada

Orange: New Democratic Party

Red: Liberal Party of Canada

Place these into the envelope. On envelope write **END OF GAME REVEAL** and **NO PEEKING** (optional).



Step Twelve:

Cut the Playing Card handouts into separate sections for each of the players.


Step Thirteen:

Setup game:

Setup game pieces. Handout out Game Cards.

Place envelope aside or beside question card box. Place question index cards in square.

Social infrastructure

A Liberal government will provide almost \$20 billion over 10 years for social infrastructure — things like affordable housing, child care spaces, communities centres, and more. We'll help build things that make a positive difference in your life.

Green infrastructure

We will cancel tax breaks and benefits for the wealthy – including the Universal Child Care Benefit – and introduce a new Canada Child Benefit to give Canadian families more money to raise their kids.

With the Canada Child Benefit, nine out of ten Canadian families will receive more than under Stephen Harper's confusing collection of child benefit programs. For the typical family of four, that means an additional \$2,500 in help, tax-free, every year.

We will also lift more Canadians – including children and seniors – out of poverty.

Instructions

- 1. Assign player pieces and make sure every player has a playing card. Each player puts their piece on the "CENTRE" to start.
- 2. Youngest player is the first questioner.
- 3. Questioner picks up a question card and reads it out loud.
- 4. Players record their answer on their own playing card.
- 5. Each player then takes turns talking about the question, starting with the player to the left of the questioner. Each player must say something.
- 6. Players then read their answers out loud, starting again with the player to the left of the questioner.
- 7. Questioner opens up the question card and reads the instructions. Players move their pieces accordingly.
- 8. The player to the left of the questioner becomes the new questioner and repeats this process.
- 9. At the end of the game, players note what colour space they ended on and uncover what that coloured space represents and explanations (in the envelope).

Explanations for Envelope (End of Game)

ORANGE: New Democratic Party

- Known for being the most left wing on the spectrum
- Heavy emphasis on social consciousness. Government should fund and regulate social programs
- Government style: very involved and present in the day-to-day lives of citizens
- Equal chances; equal opportunities
- Youngest federal party in Canada

GREEN: Green Party of Canada

- Known for being left wing, falling in between New Democratic Party and Liberal Party of Canada
- Heavy emphasis on the environment
- Government style: very involved and present in the day –to-day lives of citizens
- Core values of ecological wisdom, social justice, and nonviolence
- Eliminate tuition rates across Canada

RED: Liberal Party of Canada

- Known for being left-centre, falling in between Green Party of Canada and Conservative Party of Canada
- Oldest federal party
- Individual freedom for present and future generations: political freedom, same-sex marriage, etc.
- National unity: actively work with other countries to solve problems

BLUE: Conservative Party of Canada

- Known for being the most right wing on the spectrum
- Government style: not as active in the day-to-day lives of citizens; freedom to make decisions (ex. businesses not as limited)
- Supporter of International Trade Agreements, such as NAFTA and TPP
- Government should not as heavily fund and regulate social programs

Left Wing OR Right Wing Questions

Should terminally ill patients be allowed to end their lives via assisted suicide?

Should people be able to freely demonstrate any aspect of their culture?

Should Canada allow the logging of old growth forests?

Should the federal government subsidize the production and consumption of renewable energy sources?

Should the pensions of retired workers be taxed?

Should Canada raise or lower the tax rate for corporations?

Should employment insurance be given to those who work seasonal jobs including tourism, fishery and farming?

Should the federal government be able to monitor phone calls and emails?

Should there be more or less gun control?

Should prescription drugs be covered under Canada's universal healthcare plan?

Should marijuana be legalized for recreational use?

Should corporations, unions, and non-profit organizations be allowed to donate to political parties?

Should Canadian soldiers be more involved in Iraq?

Should the government enact a stricter immigration policy?

Should abortion be legal?

Should healthcare be privatized?

Should same-sex marriage be legal?

Should the federal government put a cap on university tuition rates?

Should the federal government make wealthy citizens (top 1%) pay higher taxes?

Should the federal government fund social programs?

Should the new sexual education curriculum be taught in schools?
